Stewardship Reflection

Today's readings remind us that stewardship is not just a thing we do — rather, stewardship is at the core of who we are as disciples of Christ.

Our first reading, from Isaiah, contains this prophecy of Christ and what His saving message would mean to all who embrace it. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone." We are among those blessed people on whom the light of Christ has shone. By virtue of our Baptism, we, who were once in the darkness of original sin, have been reborn into the great light that is God's grace in us. We are cherished members of God's family.

What a privilege! Yet, with this privilege comes the responsibility to actually live for God and to bring His Good News to all those we meet — at work, at school, in our community and right in our own home — in other words, to live as His good stewards.

And there is a certain urgency that comes with the call to a stewardship way of life as we see in our Gospel passage from Matthew. Jesus says, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." In other words, turn away from selfishness, turn towards God and live as His disciple now — don't wait!

In this same passage, the very first disciples give us examples of a good steward's prompt "yes" when the Lord called to them. Our Lord invites them to "Come after me and I will make you fishers of men." They did not hesitate but "at once they left their nets and followed him." They put our Lord and His will first.

This is the essence of a stewardship way of life — to be always ready for the ways that our Lord is calling us to bring His light to others. It's more than something we do — it's who we are.

As many of you are aware, our nation began a National Eucharistic Revival last June. Our celebration here in our Diocese began this Revival on the Feast of the Body and Blood of Jesus with a Eucharistic procession from our Cathedral to Capitol park. The Revival continues to gain momentum as we simply remember the gift of being called to live in the presence of Christ who is the source of all life.

When we speak of the word “Eucharist”, we remember that at its root, the word means to give thanks. A revival might sound like we need to invent all sorts of ways to bring the Eucharist more into our lives, but in reality, it is a chance for us to simply find more ways to thank Christ. To thank someone is to put their presence, their actions, and their gifts at the center of our thoughts and to acknowledge, at that moment, they have contributed something positive to our lives. When we thank Christ through the Eucharist, we acknowledge that His presence, actions, and gifts have contributed something positive to

our lives. A revival will strive to make saying “thank you” to Jesus a continuous act, acknowledging that every breath we take, every beat of the heart, and every joy-filled moment is a gift from God.

This Eucharistic Revival is more than finding opportunities to be receiving the Eucharist through worship and adoration. It requires “metanoia”, a change of one’s life, a conversion of the heart in which Christ is all-consuming. Each time we eat His flesh and drink His blood, we are consumed by Him. Each time we kneel in adoration, we are adored by Him. Each time we break bread together in our homes, we are broken and converted into His Body and Blood. Each time we are blessed, we offer ourselves to God and our neighbor. Each time we gratefully acknowledge His presence, our presence is pulled more deeply into His divine Presence.

The challenge of this Eucharistic Revival is to see that “Eucharist” is present at every moment for all people; that Church is a way of living and not a building or a segment of our daily routine; that Christ is not simply relegated to tabernacles and pious words. A Eucharistic Revival demands that we convert, a true repentance acknowledging that the Kingdom of Heaven (and not my kingdom or your kingdom) is at hand!

The Sunday of the Word of God

“He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures” (Lk 24:45).

In his *moto proprio* of September 30, 2019, *Aperuit illis*, Pope Francis declared that “The Third Sunday of Ordinary Time is to be devoted to the celebration, study, and dissemination of the word of God. This *Sunday of the Word of God* will thus be a fitting part of that time of year when we are encouraged to strengthen our bonds with the Jewish people and to pray for Christian unity...Various communities will find their own ways to mark this *Sunday* with a certain solemnity...A day devoted to the Bible should not be seen as a yearly event but rather a year-long event, for we urgently need to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and of the risen Lord, who continues to speak His word and to break bread in the community of believers”.

Apostolic Letter



Reflection on Desiderio Desideravi, Installment #11

In the two paragraphs of #31, Pope Francis brings up the importance of the “liturgical question”. Should we accept the reformed Roman Rite, the liturgical books, “promulgated by Saint Paul VI and Saint John Paul II, in conformity with the decrees of Vatican Council II”. The tension between accepting the reformed rite, the *Novus Ordo*, and the Traditional Latin Mass is not a simple matter of taste. “The problematic is primarily ecclesiological. I do not see how it is possible to say that one recognizes the validity of the Council...and at the same time not accept the liturgical reform born out of *Sacrosanctum Concilium*”. He sees it as his duty to affirm the *Novus Ordo*. He therefore wrote an Apostolic letter “Traditions custodes” or “Guardians of the Tradition” which restricts the celebration of the Traditional Latin Mass. He has written this Apostolic letter as a follow up to that one. He writes that the tension between the two rites, and a “superficial understanding” of the liturgical reform is a

distraction from asking vital questions: “how can we grow in our capacity to live in full the liturgical action? How do we continue to let ourselves be amazed at what happens in the celebration under our very eyes?” He ends by saying, “We are in need of a serious and dynamic liturgical formation.”

Our next reflection begins a section of the letter entailing the importance of liturgical formation, and gives us some ideas on how to accomplish this formation.

For now, it is good for us to remember, “...the liturgy is the summit toward which the activity of the Church is directed; at the same time it is the font from which all her power flows.” *Sacrosanctum Concilium* #10

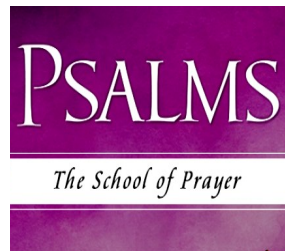

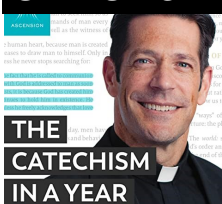

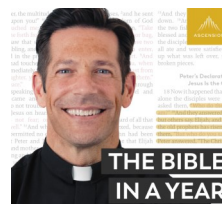
Between Capernaum and Korazin, near the Sea of Galilee.

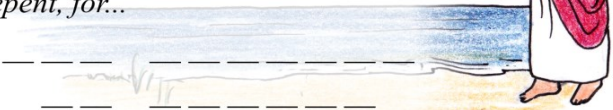

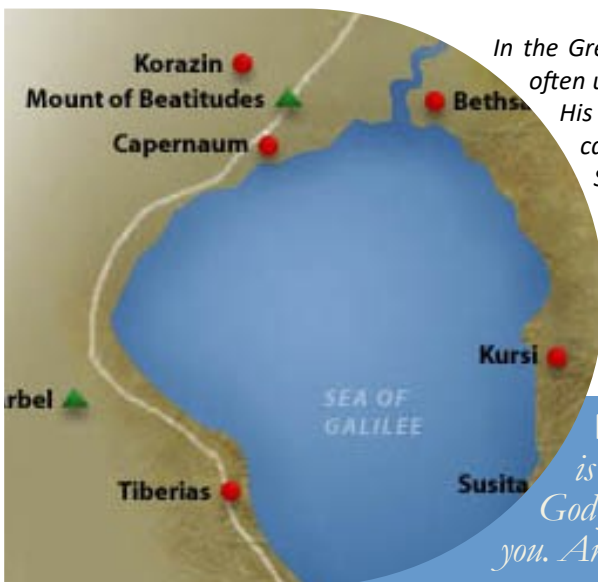

Makarios (Greek) = Godlike Joy

In the Greek Bible the word used for 'blessed' is 'Makarios'. English Bible translations often use 'blessed' or 'happy'. But what Jesus wants us to know is that the happiness His way of life brings is beyond what we can obtain by our own merit, and it cannot be reproduced artificially. The Christian joy that Jesus describes in the Sermon on the Mount cannot be gained—or lost—by you or taken by others. Jesus offers a serene, untouchable joy which is only gained by entrusting all to Him. A joy no one can take away from you. The first Beatitude reads: 'Blessed are the poor in spirit for theirs is the kingdom of God. In light of Makarios, it can mean: "O the happiness of the man who has realized his own utter helplessness, and who has put his whole trust in God (Poor in Spirit), for in his perfect obedience he will be a citizen of the Kingdom of Heaven."

PRACTICE IT: Jesus challenges us in the beatitudes, true happiness is not a feeling but is based on trusting fully in God. This week, give God your struggle and ask Him to help you to TRUST in His will for you. And let yourself wait for the joy only He can give you.

Family Bible Moment

Last Sunday we looked at Matthew 4:12-23, the Gospel for today which tells of the beginning of Jesus' ministry and the call of the first four disciples (do you remember who they are?). Looking ahead to next week—4th Sunday of Ordinary Time—we pick up one of our faith themes from this year's faith formation: the Beatitudes.

Read next Sunday's Gospel, **Matthew 5:1-12**

- Jesus goes up the mountain and begins to teach.
- The first word that Jesus speaks in his famous Sermon on the Mount to his disciples is, "Blessed", which means 'happy' or sometimes translated as 'favored'. How many times does Jesus say 'blessed' in the Gospel passage?
- In His sermon on the Beatitudes, Jesus names a suffering or difficulty, and a consolation for those who are faithful despite their struggle. Read the Beatitudes at home together and talk about which consolation you need right now in your life. Pray and ask Jesus for that 'blessing'.

4th Commandment & the Domestic Church

4to Mandamiento y la Iglesia Doméstica

Last week we looked at how the Great Commandment, how we should love the Lord above all things, and love our neighbor as ourselves.

(See Matthew 22:37-40).

The fourth commandment: *"Honor your father and mother."*

The placement of this command, directly following our duties to God, reveals to us its great importance in how we are to prioritize our love. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says:

"God has willed that, after him, we should honor our parents to whom we owe life and who have handed on to us the knowledge of God" (CCC 2197).

It is in the Christian family where faith, hope, and love abide, and where each member is called to continue the work of Jesus by sharing the "Good News" of salvation with others. Because of this, the family is also called the "Domestic Church." In this context, it can help us to see how this proclamation of the Gospel is with our words, but most often it is with the way in which our family lives out our life of faith. It is in the family where we first begin our journey of Life in Christ.

A Glimpse of Spirituality (靈修一瞥) 57

On the last day, there will be no depending on the resources of others, and no borrowing of grace. The attitude of the five wise virgins in the parable implies that Christians should attend to their faith of the present, preparing now rather than waiting until it is too late.

The wise virgins represent those who are expecting for Christ's second coming while the groom is Christ. The wedding feast is the eternal kingdom of God. The groom's arrival in the dark night signifies the second coming of the Messiah.

What should we do while we wait? The answer is: Have enough oil for lamps. What is this oil? The Greek term "elaion" is simply olive oil which is for feeding the lamp. If this oil symbolizes Christians' mercy and love; the lamp is the good works to the needy as well as some scripture scholars reflect on what this oil symbolizes is the relationship between Christians and God who is the source and power behind Christians' good deeds (cf. Matt 3:8, 10; 7:16-19, 20; 12:33; 13:8, 23, 26; 21:19, 34, 41, 43). It is not something that one can attain overnight as the foolish virgins attempted to do. The good works of Christians are the heartfelt concern for the needy and constant acts of justice. In short, the parable illustrates that entering into God's kingdom cannot be obtained at the last minute; rather, it requires a good relationship with God and good works to the needy.

Our lamps of faith have to be ready for the end of lives. Spiritual readiness motivates Christians to reach out to the world, like lamps shining in the darkness. Moreover, this lamp does not only shed light on the needy but also on the way to the eternal kingdom of God as well as overcoming life difficulties.

Spiritual reflection: what is the oil that we have to prepare? This might be the oil of mercy, love, patience, and empathy. God is calling us to take our lamps in order to meet Jesus more adequately when he comes to us. On the way to heaven, even a tiny spark from the lamp of Christians' life will bring hope to the needy in their darkness.

末日，沒人能夠依賴別人資源，或從他人借來恩寵，好讓他們順利升天。比喻中五個明智童女的態度，暗示基督徒要關注他們現在的信仰，準備就在當下，而不是等到人生最後一秒。

明智童女代表那些期待基督再來的人，新郎是基督，婚宴是永恆天國，新郎在黑夜中突然而至，象徵默西亞第二次降臨。

在等待默西亞第二次來臨的時候，要做什麼？答案：準備足夠燈油。

什麼油？希臘語 "elaion" 是簡單的橄欖油，用來點燈。如果這油象徵基督徒的慈悲大愛；燈就是對有需要者的善行；一些聖經學者認為，這油象徵基督徒與天主之間的美好關係，而天主是人們善行背後的泉源和力量（參瑪3:8,10;7:16-19,20;12:33;13:8,23,26; 21:19,34,41,43）。

時常醒悟，不是糊塗童女的態度，她們只望一天之內就可升天。基督徒的善行是發自內心關注有需要者，並且不斷伸張正義。簡言之，比喻說明基督徒不能在最後一刻才嚷著進入天國；反之，是與天主建立良好關係，以及對有需要者的善行。

信仰之燈必須為生命的終結做好準備。神修上的準備，促使基督徒向世界伸出援手，就像黑暗中閃耀的燈一樣。此外，這燈不僅照亮有需要者，而且照亮通往天國的路，以及克服生活種種困難。

反思：基督徒要準備什麼油？是慈悲、大愛、忍耐和同理心的油。天主召叫基督徒拿起自己的燈，好讓他們遇見耶穌。通往天堂路上，即使是基督徒油燈的一朵微小火花，也為生活黑暗中的苦者，帶來人生希望。
