










Happy New Year!

We enter this new liturgical year, the 1st Sunday in Advent, still in the midst of an ongoing pandemic. The second round of closures, the purple tier, a sudden jump in COVID-19 cases, continues to radically transform the liturgical experience, as we once knew it. What used to be pews once again filled with parishioners

has returned to mere empty spaces. A positive take, if any, is that these shutdowns have served as an opportunity for the local Church to embrace more so than ever, an acceptance of what it means to worship virtually. This expedited process has also challenged parishes to not only quickly adapt to online services, but also broadcast them in such a way to maintain the reverent and spiritual sacredness of the liturgical act taking place in our midst. Catholics can virtually attend Mass at different parishes worldwide. Here at the Cathedral, efforts to broadcast the Mass has been entrusted to the Cathedral Young Adults.


In the infancy of our livestream, long before the pandemic, video recordings of the Cathedral choir were captured as they filled the Church with their angelic voices. These moments were filmed only using an iPhone! These seemingly distant memories may still be found in the video section of the Cathedral Facebook account. This was the birth of the Cathedral Livestream (AV) Team. This is one of the more "visible" ministries carried out by the Cathedral Young Adults. Today, the team has grown to 4-7 Young Adults who work collaboratively to broadcast the Mass daily (with the exception of Saturday). Just prior to the pandemic, with no knowledge that the pandemic would hit, there was a sense of urgency to upgrade our equipment. Livestream Video Production equipment was procured to replace the iPhone which had run its' course. Today, with the assistance of generous donors, the Young Adults have added more cameras and upgraded technology to continue our mission, to bring the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass to parishioners here at home, in our Diocese, and worldwide. Operations have moved to the balcony where a small studio of sorts was erected. While we strive to put out a quality product and maintain a reverent presence, we are not immune to the occasional technical difficulty here and there. Please know that we recognize how much our dear parishioners yearn to actively participate at Mass. We hear you and work expeditiously to troubleshoot problems and resolve them in a timely manner.

Despite this second shutdown, our commitment remains to serve the People of God not only in our ministry of Livestreaming, but also in all the ministries that we carry out. Rest assured of our prayers for you all and do know that we do not take this ministry lightly. We welcome and thank you in advance for your prayers for us!

God certainly makes Himself known through physical and concrete objects. As Church we want to help all to believe that as much as we are part of this world, both beautiful and ugly, there exists another Kingdom in which the clarity of God's love is experienced more profoundly than our current

language can express. The Church, us, move in our pilgrim journey to give hope to all others who labor under the clouds of darkness and the illusion that life is solitary, material, and Godless. As we begin this wonderful season of Advent, we want to invite your family to take up the tradition of the Advent Wreath, or follow us each week with the adventure through the Bible with the Jesse Tree. Watch here each week for more prayers and ways to make this Advent time a meaningful one.



An Advent wreath is a wreath of laurel, spruce or similar foliage with four candles that are lighted successively in the weeks of Advent to symbolize the light that the birth of Christ brought into the world. Traditionally three of the candles are purple, the color of kings and of penance. A rose-colored candle is used to mark the Third Sunday of Advent as a time to rejoice over the closeness of Christmas and the coming of Christ.

Children love the beauty of the simple traditional ceremony. Lighting candles in an Advent Wreath is a simple way to start a tradition of family worship in the home. Those who participate will cherish the experience all their lives.

FIRST WEEK PRAYER (prayed every night before dinner, or time when you are together)

Leader: O Lord, stir up Thy might, we beg You, and come, That by Your protection we may deserve to be rescued from the threatening dangers of our sins and saved by Thy deliverance. Through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen. (The candle is allowed to burn during evening meals for the first week.)



Our A Family of Faith families have been studying the how we have lost Original Grace and Holiness through the sin of the sin of Adam and Eve. But God in His great love for us has given us a way back to relationship with Him, and made promises through covenants with the Patriarchs and Prophets. The Jesse Tree project lets us follow the story of Salvation throughout the days leading up to Christmas. The Children can use our templates (on our website) to make their own ornaments to hang on the tree. We will summarize them here for you for this week.



DEC 1—God Created Humans (Genesis 1-2)

God created everything, but with humans, he called the creation "very good". This is because we are like God in our Intellect,



DEC 2—The First Sin (Genesis 3)

Adam and Eve sought to be like God on their terms. In doing so, they disobeyed Him. They were sent out of the Garden of Eden and would have to work hard for their living.



DEC 3—The Flood (Genesis 6:11—9:17)

As the people became numerous, they turned away from God. God sent a flood to cleanse the earth of wickedness, but makes a promise through Noah and his



DEC 4-Promise to Abraham (GEN 22:1-19)

Abram and Sarai didn't have any children, but God made a promise that his offspring would be as numerous as the stars in the sky.



DEC 5—Offering of Isaac (Genesis 27-28) Abraham (once called Abram) does have a

son and names him Isaac. God tests him and asks him to sacrifice his son. Abraham in obedience prepares to do what is asked, and God renews his covenant with him.



DEC 6—Renewal of Promise (GEN 27-28)

Jacob, Abaraham's son grows up and on a journey he wrestles with an Angel. The Angel gives Jacob a message that he will be the heir of a great King (Jesus).



DEC 7—God's Providence (GEN 37, 39:1-

50:21) One of Jacob's sons, his favorite Joseph, is sold into slavery by his own brothers (!). We learn how even when bad things happen, God uses it for good.



Good Deeds for Jesus

We know the story of how Mary and Jesus could not find a place for Jesus to stay in Bethlehem. This Advent, we can help them by preparing a place for Jesus with our good deeds. Make a crib for Jesus (you can use just about anything—a small basket or box). Using either pieces of yarn or strips of paper, you add them to Jesus "manger" with every good deed you do. That way every time you do something for someone else, you make it a prayer, "For you Baby Jesus".
